

Bdy. of Yakima Indian Reservation from Grayback Peak, Sec. 20, T. 6 N.,
R. 14 E., to Spencer Point, Sec. 9, T. 11 N., R. 12 E., via Blazed
Trees, Goat Butte, Summit of Cascade Mts. and Klickton Divide.

this tree is a yellow pine stump, approximately 32 ins.
dia., with the trunk of the tree lying nearby. Both
the tree trunk and the stump have been partially destroy-
ed by fire and are badly decayed. Mr. Lincoln states that
this is the tree which was blazed on the side facing Mt.
Adams. Against the E. side of this stump I set an
iron post, 3 ft. long, 3 ins. dia., for angle point
No. 1, sec. 7, T. 6 N., R. 13 E., on the Yakima Indian
Reservation bdy. as hereinafter described.

All evidence of the "Indian Trail" at its junction
with the Goldendale road has disappeared. It is still
plainly visible at a point about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile NE. of the Blazed
Trees, however. This trail was noted at 9.62 chs.

on the line bet. secs. 7 and 8, by Deputy Surveyor
Richardson in his survey of the subdivision of T. 6 N.,
R. 13 E., in 1878, as "Trail to Fort Simcoe, NE. and SW"

In my retracement of the line bet. secs. 7 and 8,
T. 6 N., R. 13 E., as set forth in Book "B" of this
Group, the Glenwood-Goldendale road is noted at 5.69
chains N. 0° 02' W. of the original cor. of secs.

7, 8, 17, and 18, at which point the road bears E. and W.

It is therefore evident that the junction of the Indian
trail and the Goldendale Road was in the immediate vicinity
of the trees pointed out to me by Abraham Lincoln.
